I am pleased to submit this letter in support of the Indian Nations Council of Governments' (INCOG) application for a Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant for its Tulsa-Jenks Multi-Modal Safety Project: Connecting Communities for Equity and Safety. This multi-jurisdictional, community-supported project enhances transportation infrastructure, improves safety, and increases connectivity along the Arkansas River corridor in the Tulsa region, and will have a significant local and regional impact.

INCOG is the Metropolitan Planning Organization for transportation planning in the Tulsa area and has a long history of working with local communities and tribal governments to create partnerships to address community needs. INCOG's Multi-Modal Safety Project will improve connections from neighborhoods to businesses as well as major destinations in south Tulsa and Jenks that are along the Arkansas River, including the Jenks Riverwalk Crossing and the Turkey Mountain Urban Wilderness in Tulsa.

The Arkansas River is the region's defining physical feature, however, for many years, the river was seen as a hindrance and not as an asset. With the opening of a pedestrian bridge and subsequent construction of the Zink dam when I was Mayor of Tulsa, the community began to turn its attention to the river in a positive way and recognize the potential that it offered.

This project continues to build on those earlier efforts and addresses the Department's priorities of safety, quality of life, mobility and community connectivity, and state of good repair. With the voter-approved matching funds provided by Tulsa and Jenks and the wide community support for the project, I offer my strong support for INCOG's RAISE application. I am confident this project will bring increased economic development to this area of Tulsa. As an entrepreneur, I understand the importance of seeking a business location where there is a destination for people to gather and congregate. The construction of 7.75 miles of new multi-use trail in tandem with the locally funded Tulsa/Jenks low water dam and pedestrian bridge will create a regional destination and public space.

Since COVID-19 and the increased number of remote workers, people on both east and west coasts are seeking out the Midwest to find a new place to live where it is less crowded, and the cost of living is more affordable. The Tulsa-Jenks Multi-Modal Safety Project will help the Tulsa region be more competitive by creating a destination for all families to enjoy. The Indian Nations Council of Governments (INCOG) and the Muscogee Nation are pleased to submit this application for the Tulsa-Jenks Multi-Modal Safety Project as part of the Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) program.

INCOG and the Muscogee Nation are working closely with the City of Tulsa, the City of Jenks, and Tulsa County to construct an enhanced multimodal trail system and associated access improvements along the east and west banks of the Arkansas River to improve safety, meet state of good repair standards, and increase access to this critical active transportation system for residents in Areas of Persistent Poverty and Historically Disadvantaged Communities within the project area. The project will extend and upgrade the existing river trail system and significantly improve roadway design and traffic control infrastructure at arterial roadway crossings to make safe access to the trail system a possibility. The project will connect specifically to the Turkey Mountain Urban Wilderness Area, a major recreational destination, as well as a locally funded pedestrian bridge and low-water dam. The project will provide for a fully separated trail surface for bicycles and pedestrians from vehicular traffic to provide safe travel conditions creating a Complete Street corridor along the high volume- high speed Riverside Parkway corridor.

The project is an investment that will be locally maintained, improving access to jobs in the two communities in Oklahoma, providing an opportunity for alternative transportation modes for no-car households, increasing the number of electric vehicle charging stations and bikeshare stations in the area. This project is a high priority for INCOG, and the Muscogee Nation and the project is ready for implementation based on wide ranging and long-standing planning and design studies. Federal support for this multi-jurisdictional, environmentally sustainable project that will advance equity is necessary to realize the community vision and benefits to be achieved by this project. The project is derived from the Connected 2045: Regional Transportation Plan, the Regional Bicycle/Pedestrian Plan, and the Arkansas River Corridor Master Plans. INCOG is committed to include the project within the Transportation Improvement Program when RAISE funding is secured.

The Muscogee (Creek) Nation (MCN) is a self-governed Native American tribal government whose tribal boundary encompasses 7,200 square miles in eleven counties in Oklahoma, including the City of Jenks and the southern portion of the City of Tulsa. We are one of the historic five Civilized Tribes and the fourth largest tribe in the U.S. with 86,100 citizens. Because of our presence in the Tulsa metropolitan area region, we have a history of working in tandem with our local communities to complete projects that enhance our region, and thus strengthening the Muscogee Nation.

An example of one of these projects is when MCN realigned a section of Tulsa River Parks trails from the front of the River Spirit Casino and Resort to behind it and along the banks of the Arkansas River. The original multiuse trail paralleled Riverside Parkway, a high speed, multi-lane arterial, and crosses three major driveways of MCN property. It was a dangerous section of trail where there were multiple conflicts between vehicles, bikes and pedestrians with some crashes requiring the medical attention of first responders. MCN paid for the construction of the new one-mile section of the trail. This accomplished two objectives, eliminating conflicts between motorized vehicles and trail users, and the second was to upgrade the trail to the adopted regional dual trail standard. This is to say that MCN understands the priority of making our most vulnerable transportation system users safer.

The Nation is co-sponsoring INCOG's RAISE application for the Tulsa-Jenks Multi-Modal Safety Project as we are committed to a collaborative relationship with the Cities of Jenks and Tulsa to improve our region. The objective of the proposed RAISE project is to connect communities with safe alternative transportation options and to improve traffic signals at eight intersections, two of which serve as entrances to our Muscogee Nations' property on the Eastbank of the River. On the Westbank, the Arkansas River is a barrier that prohibits pedestrians and people on bikes from connecting to our entertainment district to other existing destinations. The improved and connected trail system will also provide an alternate means for many of our employees who live nearby to get to work.

I request USDOT to partner with the Muscogee Nation, INCOG, City of Tulsa & City of Jenks on this regionally significant project.

As the Mayor of Tulsa, I am excited for our city to partner with the City of Jenks, INCOG and the Muscogee Nation on the Tulsa-Jenks Multi-Modal Safety Project. This project truly has local and regional significance. The project combines two elements that are high priorities for the City of Tulsa, infrastructure investments to encourage and support Tulsa's adopted Complete Streets policy and environmentally sustainable river development. Both initiatives promote a healthy lifestyle and increase the quality of life for Tulsans.

The Arkansas River is Tulsa's defining physical feature and provides an opportunity to be an economic driver for our future. For much of our city's history, the river was polluted and treated more as a barrier and a problem rather than an asset. Since the approval of a community-based Arkansas River Corridor Vision Master Plan nearly 15 years ago, we have developed a world class trail system along portions of the corridor; however, it is not continuous and does not connect to many neighborhoods and emerging destinations.

The City's vision extends to working with our local partners to help fund the construction of 7.75 miles of multi-use trail along the river with a \$3 million match towards the project. The RAISE grant will create a multi-modal corridor that will connect much of the City of Tulsa to a planned locally funded dam and bicycle/pedestrian bridge. The current route from Turkey Mountain to Jenks and south Tulsa neighborhoods is on a two-lane 45 mph road with no shoulders. This along with the safety improvements on Riverside Parkway and additional trails on the east side of the river will create an overall better user experience.

As a former mayor, you understand that Midwest American cities' futures depend on creating great public spaces and providing access to them. This project goes to the heart of USDOT's RAISE grant emphasis on improved access to reliable, safe, and affordable transportation by improving infrastructure condition, addressing public health and safety, state of good repair, and promoting regional connectivity.





When visitors come to Tulsa, one of the first things they notice is the sense of community and the spirit of working together through collaboration and partnerships that exist within our region. We look forward to partnering with USDOT on this project of local and regional significance.

As a Tulsa City Councilor from District 8, I would like to express my enthusiastic support for INCOG's RAISE grant application for the Tulsa-Jenks Multi-Modal Safety Project: Connecting Communities for Equity and Safety. This project was first conceptualized as a part of the 1999 Trails Regional Masterplan funded with a Transportation Enhancement Grant. The plan was approved as a part of the Long-Range Transportation Plan and the Tulsa Comprehensive Plan by the Tulsa City Council over 20 years ago.

The RAISE grant application proposes constructing 7.75 miles of multi-use trail to be built in tandem with updated ADA and pedestrian crossings at seven intersections across a major arterial, Riverside Parkway. I have been a city councilor since 2011, and I receive countless emails and phone calls from south Tulsans who desire to see the trail extended to their neighborhoods so they can have the opportunity to ride a bike or walk to work and school, access River Parks, and visit the shops and restaurants located directly across Riverside Parkway from their neighborhoods. Currently, the very busy Riverside Parkway acts as a major barrier, and it is too dangerous to cross without being in a vehicle. This grant will resolve this issue and create a significantly better quality of life for residents in adjoining neighborhoods.

The project will also provide an expanded safe transportation system for west Tulsans, including public housing residents. The connection of Turkey Mountain Urban Wilderness to the City of Jenks via a multi-use trail will create new access to jobs; and according to the City of Tulsa's 2018 equality indicators, west Tulsa scores .193 out of 1 for bikeability equity.

The Tulsa City Council and Tulsa voters have approved the use of public funds to be used as a match for the RAISE project. In addition to the direct safety and connected benefits of the project, the city will also benefit indirectly by bringing in visitors from outside the Tulsa region to enjoy river amenities. Visitors will also dine and shop at our local restaurants and entertainment districts. The sales tax income that is generated will allow Tulsa to continue to invest in progressive, transportation projects like this.

Please accept this letter of strong support and help us implement the Tulsa-Jenks Multi-Modal Safety Project. We are eager to start this project and look forward to its completion.

The City of Jenks understands that land use and development decisions made today will define what our community will look like for generations. INCOG's RAISE application for 7.75 miles of multi-use trails aligns clearly with our 2020 Comprehensive Plan. Participants in the Comprehensive Plan community engagement process "identified a need for trail improvements and expansion of the existing trails network to improve on the lack of pedestrian and bike connectivity." We are also pleased that the Tulsa-Jenks Multi-Modal Safety Project encompasses the Arkansas River corridor adjacent to the original townsite of Jenks, as much of the area is defined as a Historically Disadvantaged Community by USDOT.

The City of Jenks strongly supports the RAISE project as it will continue our efforts to improve the quality of life for the citizens of Jenks. River corridor development in the City of Jenks began with the construction of the Oklahoma Aquarium, a 501(c)3 in 2003, and later the Jenks Riverwalk Crossing in 2005 (now owned by the Muscogee Nation). In addition, in 2016, the voters of Jenks approved the Vision tax package that includes our portion of the RAISE grant funding match. The RAISE project will help spur economic growth for our city and improve mobility and community connectivity.

In addition, ADA improvements and filling in sidewalk gaps on Riverside Parkway in Tulsa helps create a Safe Route to School for Jenks Public Schools campuses located across the river in Tulsa. Another safety component of the project is the much-needed multi-use trail on top of a flood control levee along the Arkansas River connecting to the Turkey Mountain Urban Wilderness. Currently, our residents are unable to travel safely to Turkey Mountain Urban Wilderness via a bicycle or walking due to Elwood Avenue's lack of shoulders, sidewalk gaps, and posted speed limit of 45 mph along this arterial roadway.

We have worked with INCOG in the past on multi-jurisdictional grants and look forward to doing so again on this project. We urge your favorable consideration of the regionally significant Tulsa-Jenks Riverfront Connections Project so we can get started.

I am enthusiastic about INCOG's RAISE grant and the possibility of pushing our multi-use trail system further south on both the east and west sides of the Arkansas River and the much-needed ADA and pedestrian crossing improvements along the very busy Riverside Parkway. Even though the location of the proposed trail system is located in the Cities of Jenks and Tulsa, the project will benefit the entirety of Tulsa County, not just these two cities. It will enhance connections to other suburbs in Tulsa County such as Bixby and Glenpool. These connections will allow our region to grow in innovative ways by providing safe and increased mobility and access to active transportation opportunities.

Tulsa County has been a part of the concept of this plan since 2004, when the Arkansas River Vision Plan was developed. As County Commissioner, I supported the Transportation Alternative Program application Tulsa County secured to create a conceptual plan of the multi-use trail system from Turkey Mountain Urban Wilderness in Tulsa to Jenks River Walk. Now that this plan is complete, I am looking forward to seeing it come into fruition through the Tulsa-Jenks Multi-Modal Safety Project: Connecting Communities for Equity and Safety.

This project is personally so important to me that I initiated conversations with the Corp of Engineers to construct the trail on top of a two-mile stretch of the levee system. The Corp is excited about this project because it improves the levee by creating a hard surface, reduces erosion and enhances maintenance. This is important as this two-mile section of our levee system protects areas of Jenks and west Tulsa, including critical wastewater treatment infrastructure and the RL Jones, Jr. Riverside airport from flooding. The importance of the levee system cannot be underestimated as we are all too familiar with major flooding in Tulsa County that occurred along the Arkansas River in 2019.

Once the entire project is constructed and completed, Tulsa County will maintain sections of the trail that are built on top of the levee and in the levee easement. I hope USDOT partners with INCOG to move the project forward. Please let me know if I can be of further assistance.

Jenks Public Schools is pleased to submit a letter of support for the **Tulsa-Jenks Multi-Modal Safety Project: Connecting Communities for Equity and Safety.** Transportation is a central barrier for many of our students to safely and consistently attend classes and events. This project symbolizes the focus of the Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant program as the project has regional significance in terms of safety and quality of life for our students and community members within the Jenks school district.

Most of Jenks schools' campuses are within a half-mile of the multiuse path project area including Jenks High School, Jenks Freshmen Academy, and Jenks Middle School.

There are over 3,600 students at the high school campus. Jenks school district spans both sides of the Arkansas River, and two cities (Jenks and Tulsa), leading to a great need for safe alternative transportation facilities that serve students walking and riding a bike.

We are committed to creating Safe Routes to Schools. The project will include a safer pedestrian crossing at Riverside Pkwy and E 101st St S. This will allow our students to use the trails on River Parks to connect the High School with the Middle School campus. The current configuration of the intersection is very unsafe, and our kids have to rely on single-occupancy vehicles to get from one campus to the other if they have extracurricular activities at either campus.

Currently, our cross-country and track students use the multi-use trails on the Tulsa side of the river for practice. The proposed extension of the multi-use trail from Turkey Mountain Urban Wilderness to Jenks would allow our High School athletes to train closer to the High School campus in Jenks.

We hope USDOT will recognize our need to protect our children and support the implementation of Safe Route to School facilities (as a part of the Multi-Modal Safety Project) to and near our campuses and that you will partner with INCOG to make this project a reality for our families.

The Oklahoma Turnpike Authority (OTA) is pleased to submit a letter of support and partnership for INCOG's Tulsa-Jenks Multi-Modal Safety Project: Connecting Communities for Equity and Safety. This project elevates the safety of the transportation network by building or enhancing 7.75 miles of multi-use trails that are separated from major roadways. Separating vulnerable transportation users from high speed and high-volume traffic will decrease the rate of bicycle and pedestrian crashes and fatality rates.

The Turnpike Authority has extensive experience working with INCOG and its partners on projects that involve OTA's right-of-way adjacent to the Creek Turnpike and Gilcrease Expressway within Tulsa's Urbanized Transportation Area. INCOG's proposed RAISE project is of particular value because it will construct a new trail away from a congested intersection at the Creek Turnpike entrance and exit ramps and Riverside Parkway, a major regional arterial. In addition, the project includes enhanced crosswalks at this same intersection. The new multi-use trail will be located under the elevated structures of OTA's Creek Turnpike bridges on both the east and west banks of the river. Currently, trail users must cross Riverside Parkway and use a sidewalk that is next to the on and off ramps of the turnpike. In addition, this route crosses several driveways of busy commercial centers and a gas station/convenience store where vehicles constantly conflict with pedestrians and bicycles.

OTA will partner with INCOG and the Cities of Tulsa and Jenks for this project by approving a use agreement for the trail and additional trail amenities on OTA's right-of-way. The Health Department is in constant pursuit of a healthier Tulsa, and the addition of 7.75 miles of dual multi-use trail system helps us towards our vision, which is to become the healthiest county in the country. In addition, the proposed ADA, crosswalk, and pedestrian refuge improvements will provide more community connections to the river and other amenities.

Eight of the top ten deaths in Tulsa County are the result of chronic conditions like heart disease and diabetes. Healthy behaviors such as physical activity can decrease these diseases. Our built environment influences our residents' levels of physical activity as well as access to healthy food, jobs, and education. For example, inaccessible or nonexistent sidewalks and bicycle paths contribute to sedentary habits. Tulsa's Bicycle & Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) is a group of citizen advocates who promote the Safe Systems Approach (safe streets, safe speeds, safe vehicles, safe road users, and post-crash care) pertaining to bicycle and pedestrian modes.

In 2014 when INCOG was developing the GO Plan, the regional bicycle/pedestrian masterplan, members of BPAC were on the Steering Committee, providing input for safer connections in the Tulsa region. We are excited to see this plan moving forward and support INCOG's application for the Tulsa-Jenks Multi-Modal Safety Project: Connecting Communities for Equity and Safety.

Key components of this plan that align with our goal of creating an improved environment for bicycles and pedestrians are safety, comfort, and increased connectivity. Currently, if a person wanted to ride a bike or walk from Turkey Mountain Urban Wilderness to Jenks Riverwalk Crossing or the Oklahoma Aquarium, they would have to use Elwood St. This is a two-lane, 45 mph road with no shoulder and major sidewalk gaps. The proposed three-mile multi-use trail section from Turkey Mountain Urban Wilderness to Jenks would alleviate this problem. Also, the addition of ADA and intersection improvements on the east side of the river will connect more neighborhoods to numerous destinations along the river. This will decrease the percentage of dependence upon motorized vehicles for trips that are 2 miles or less and aid commuters using the river trail system.

As the bicycle and pedestrian advocacy group for the region, we ask USDOT to award INCOG's and Muscogee Nation's RAISE grant application for the Tulsa-Jenks Multi-Modal Safety Project.

The city of Tulsa and its surrounding region is known for its spirit of collaboration and partnerships, and when INCOG invited Francis Energy to be a partner of the *Tulsa-Jenks Multi-Modal Safety Project:* Connecting Communities for Equity and Safety, we welcomed the opportunity.

Our vision is to create a contiguous electric vehicle direct-current fast charging (DCFC) network every 50 miles across middle America to eradicate "range anxiety" for EV owners. With funding from the RAISE grant, Francis Energy will install four EV charging stations on each side of the two pedestrian bridges, the 96th St S. bridge and the low water/pedestrian bridge at 104th St S. These stations will benefit both the environmental sustainability and the mobility and community connectivity of the project.
